## HISTORY U. S. S. BENNINGTON (CV 20) 6 August 1944 - 15 September 1945

II. NARRATIVE

The USS Bearington (CVZO), was named for the Battle of Bennington, Vermont, fought 16 August 1777, near Bennington, Vermont. Her keel was laid at the Navy Yard, Brookyn, New York, on 15 December 1542, and she was launched 26 February 1544. The Bennington was the first of the so-called "Esex" class carriers to be built in the New York Navy Yard. She was also the first to be built in drydock, rather than on ways, with the consequence that her launching was accomplished by opening the dock gates.

While the ship was under construction, and early in May, 1944, nucleus crews assigned to the Beanington were assembled for an intensive pre-commissioning training at the Naval Training Station, Meypert, Minde Island, and at the US Navy Yard, Brooklyn, N.Y. Specialized training was obtained on other ships then on shakedown cruises, or a special school along the eastern seaboard, During these time also, Air Group SE, designated as the ship's first Air Group, undermant stremsow training at Norfolk, Yirdinia.

August 6 found the entire entire company, and the pilote of Afr Group 82 who flow to New York for the occasion, on board at the dock in the New Yard. The day was a pleasant one, and the coreamony held on the flight dock most color-ful, with the New York shyline serving as a background, Some 8,000 guests attended. The ship's chaplain aponed the cereamony with a prayer for God's bleading on the ship and her crew. Captain J.D. Sykes, USN, took official command of the ship.
