THE CHINA FLEET CLUB--The China Fleet Club is located one block to the right from Fenwick Pier, on Gloucester Road. It is a British enlisted men's club--honorary membership having been extended to visiting U. S. Navy Fleet personnel.

In the China Fleet Club Building you can find restaurants, bars, lounges, barber shop, bowling alleys, a theater and billiard room.

Rooms are available for less than \$0.25 a night.

The Display Room of the Navy Purchasing Branch is located on the third floor of this building.

You should not be misled by the souvenir shop in the Lobby or the Arcade on the second floor--neither of which are connected with the Navy's Display Room.

YOU LOSE--It is not known that anyone has cataloged all of the ruses for separating you from your money. Here are a few of them--if you read them it might save you money and more.

1. **TOUTS (OR STREET GUIDES):** These are those who offer to take you "to the best store", "a friend", "my cousin". The sidewalks between Fenwick Pier and the Display Room usually swarm with them. They will tell you that the Display Room is closed. They will offer you free transportation. The fact that both the tout and the driver usually get a cut of what you spend for perhaps a flat fee for delivering you means that you lose immediately.
2. **FREE BEER:** This is not a spontaneous gesture of friendship--you pay for it eventually several times over. With enough free beer your sharp bargaining sense may be dulled--and the price of free beer keeps going up.
3. **RICKSHAWS:** Drivers will create a scene to embarrass you into paying more. This is straight blackmail. Call a policeman to settle the matter. Your rickshaw man will quickly fade into the crowd. Otherwise be sure you are in agreement on price before starting out. A ride in a rickshaw should seldom cost more than HK\$1.00.
4. **CHANGING MONEY:** Deal in Hong Kong Dollars. Some unscrupulous shops are quite willing to help you spend U.S. Dollars--they may get a much higher exchange rate from the Communists who want dollars badly. Change your money at Fenwick Pier.
