

Captain G. W. Rahill Reports as New Chief-of-Staff

Reporting aboard BENN Oct. 26, Capt. Rahill renewed friendships with both BENNINGTON's commanding officer Capt. John S. Hill, whom he had known before World War II, as well as with the Admiral with whom he had served in the office of the Chief of Naval Operations.

In his capacity as Chief-of-Staff, the Capt. will act as consultant, advisor, and aide to Admiral Caldwell, and will coordinate the efforts of the 55 officers and men who make up the staff of COMCARDIV 19.

Although he will be serving on board a modern aircraft carrier for the first time, Capt. Rahill will be on home ground as far as the anti-submarine mission of the task group is concerned. His 24-year naval career includes destroyer command and numerous staff positions which have provided a well-rounded background in ASW.

Capt. Rahill was commanding officer of the USS GEORGE CLYMER (APA-27) prior to reporting on board BENNINGTON.

Twenty-four years have not dimmed Capt. Rahill's enthusiasm for the Navy. He terms a Navy career: "one which will benefit any young man who is not afraid of responsibility."

The Capt. and his wife, Marjorie, have five sons and live in Coronado.
