121 Receive New Crows Benn Feels PO Cutback

The effects of the current petty officer cutback in the Navy were felt aboard BENNING-TON earlier this month as exam results listed promotions for in the service-wide examinations. This is a 15% decrease as compared with 38% that were

advanced last November. Listed on the first increment of promotions, 95 must await a later decision by the Chief of Naval Personnel before they learn their effective date of advancement. Despite date of promotions, time in the grade will be retroact-

ive to 16 May. In the second increment, 26 personnel can be confident of propotions on 16 July 1964.

No designated strikers were in the Examining Center letter to BENN's personnel office. All hope is not lost as

Navy Times has stated that at least 150 more chiefs will be picked early in June. They have also reported more advancements in the 2nd increment for the three lower PO grades and are expected when the CPO list is announced. No estimate is available on the number of promotions to be made.

According to Navy Times, 71,000 promotions resulted from the February 1963 exams which included five increments of CPOs. The February 1964 exams when cumulated will bring an expected total of only 44,750 advancements with two increments of chiefs.

When the first increment promotions become effective. BENNINGTON will see seven First Class Petty Officers, 26 Second Class and 62 Third Class. In the second increment July 16, advancements will come for one First Class Petty Officer, eight Second Class, and

All is not over though. since 50 people may have passed the exam but BuPers has only authorised 30 advancements. Then the Examining Center takes the top 30 maximum scores for advancement, putting the remainder on a quota list.

This is why a person's maltiple plays an important part, You may have scored a higher examination mark but lacked in your performance evaluation while a person with a lower written score was rated over cause he had higher evaluation marks.

A high multiple, however, will never help afailing written score. A few helmful hints are; keep abreast of your rate and rating by continual study. maximum ability and conduct yourself in the highest of Naval tradition.
