GUIDED RIGHT

As you should be well aware, the Navy provides a countless number of "special programs" which are available for the asking, if certain eligibility requirements are met. The Education and Training Officer has set aside two hours per day, from 0900 to 1100, for the express purpose of interviewing anyone who is interested in pursuing any of these programs. Counseling is also available for those who wish to have questions answered on any phase of a "special" Naval Training Program.

HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMAS

When someone successfully completes the USAFI General Educational and Development Test Battery (GED), he is deemed worthy of having completed four years of high school work and is granted the equivalent of a high school diploma. This GED diploma is being accepted by Boards of Education throughout the United States as readily as a General High School Diploma. Far too often personnel are denied the privilege of taking the GED tests because they haven't allowed themselves adequate time to prepare themselves for the exams. Don't wait until one year before separation before enrolling in the GED Program. Consider the four years it takes to attain a regular high school diploma, then consider the time you have left in the Navy. Also, consider the importance of a high school diploma today.

COLLEGE ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

The Education Office has written to approximately fifty leading colleges and universities throughout the United States requesting admission requirements and general in-

formation pertaining to the individual schools. Those personnel who are interested in attending college upon separation from the Navy are free to examine our newly established file and inquire further about the school of their choice.
