

1944 to 1964; USS BENNINGTON, Sleek, fast, modern...

TWENTY YEARS OLD

BENNINGON in 20-years old this month but the story behind the ship and her famous ness go back in history 187 years. On 16 August 1777, about 2,000°Green Mountain Boogs' under John Stark took up positions five niles south of Benington Versont. There, the British Army, commanded by the willy



Gen. John Burgoyne, sent first one division and then another against the Americans, who fired from behind trees and boulders fleeing English left 900 casualties while Stark counted 82 casualties. Stark's men had successfully defended a store of American supplies at Bennington, and inflicted a major defeat on Burgoyne to boot.

HE GUNBOAT

In its first tribute to this victory, the Bany assigned the name ENDULHNION to a 1700-ten gumboat, sinter ship of the gambats IECINSTON and COMCORD. Coemissioned in 1871, the vocal was hull as a three-masted steem schooner and armed with six gums. She operated in South Allantic and Daropean waters until 1894 when she joined the Parific Flest.

Massed out of Marine Island, BENNINGTON operated along the Pucific Coast of North and Central America and the Bassiian Islands until the outbreak of the Spanish-American War.
