materially to the success of an epic strike in which all capital ships of the enemy Fleet at Kure were sunk or damaged." Little more than a month after the attack on Kure. Leslie's squadron led a massive airborne processional over the formal surrender of Japan on September 2, 1945 aboard the USS Missouri, anchored in Tokyo Bay. For several years after the war, Leslie worked as a flight instructor at Pensacola. He served in the Korean War from 1952-1953, and after discharge worked as a crop-duster in the Central Valley town of Kerman, west of Fresno. He spent most of that second career flying an old friend, the Stearman Bi-Wing. He and Audrey moved to Tuolumne County in 1985.
