Benn's yard period Nearing its end

Bennington is well on her way toward the end of her six-month ward period.

The ship entered the vards on November 18 last year. She had been scheduled to enter drydcck in mid-December, but was set back when the Bon Ecrope Pichard (CVA-31) entered the drydock instead for energency repairs. Bean finally got her chance on January 7.

While in drydcck, all four props were replaced: the bottom was sandblasted and painted; the sonar dome underwent repair; all Aveas, JP-5, fresh and feedwater tanks and some fuel tanks were sandblasted and refinished; all sea valves and shafting were inspected, and the number three shaft Continued on page 12
